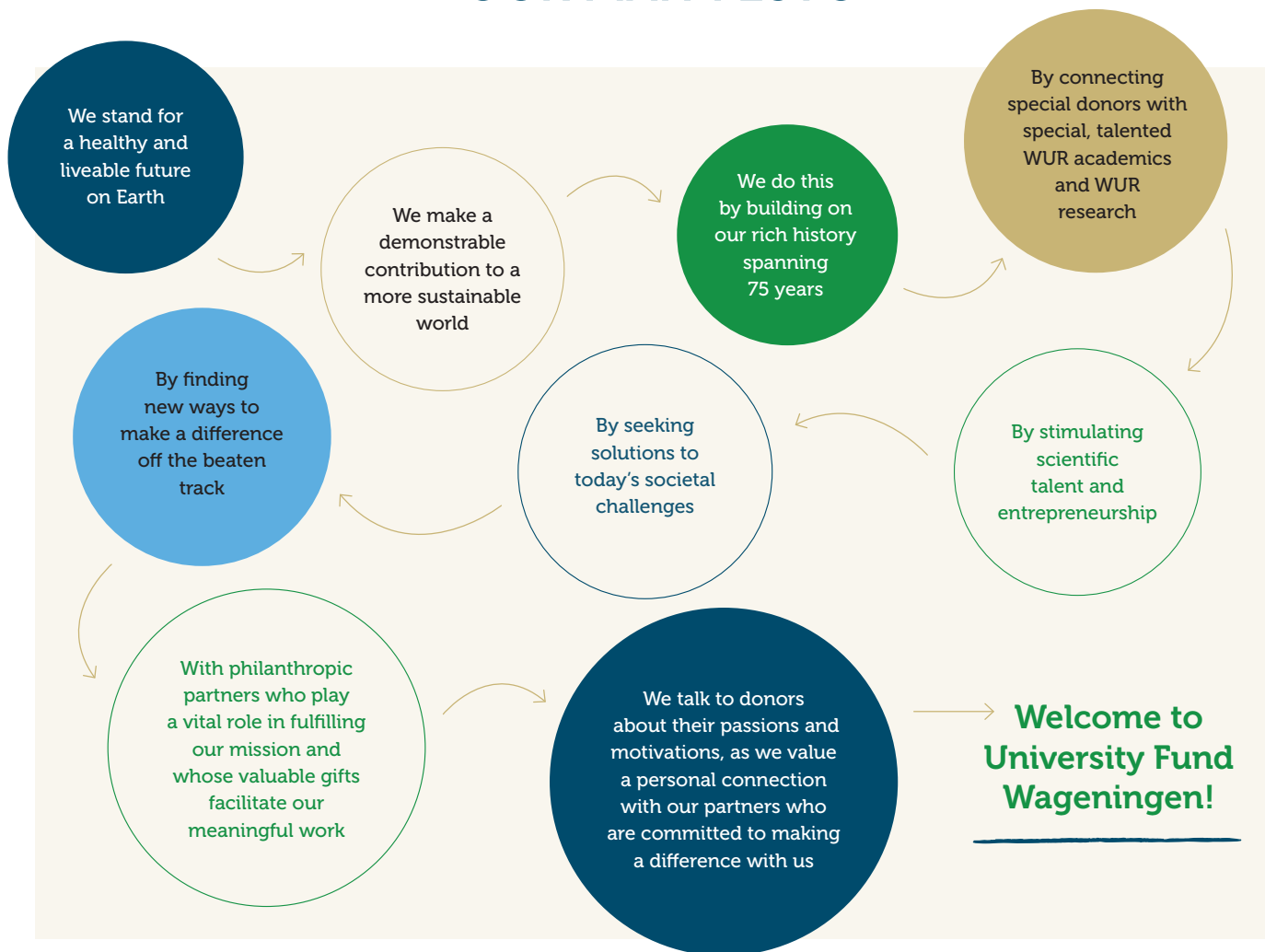

SCHOLARSHIPS: EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES FOR TALENT

Through named funds within the Wageningen University Fund, we provide scholarships and travel grants. For some talented students, studying is financially out of reach; thanks to these scholarship funds, we offer equal opportunities to pursue a degree in Wageningen. Travel grants give students the opportunity to gain international experience, exchange knowledge and participate in study or research abroad.

Our named funds that make this possible include the Anne van den Ban Fund, the Gijsbert Oomen Fund, the Paul Speijer Fund, the Pavlos Condellis Fund, the Future Animal Nutrition Africa (FANA) Fund, the Nico Buisman Fund, the Van Rumpst Scholarship Fund, the LEB Travel Fund and the student conference grants from our Friends Fund.

The best-known fund that provides scholarships is the Anne van den Ban Fund. For many years, this fund has supported promising students from low- and middle-income countries to pursue a Master's degree at WUR. After graduating, they return to their home countries with the knowledge and contacts they have gained in Wageningen.

The Anne van den Ban Fund was set up 30 years ago and named after Anne van den Ban (1928–2016). As the founder and first professor of Extension Education at Wageningen, he understood that a country's development begins with education and the transfer of knowledge. Guided by this vision, Wageningen University and the Anne van den Ban Fund have now helped more than 350 students to realise their dreams and apply Wageningen's knowledge worldwide.

There are many more young, driven students like Hassan and Leah who dream of making an impact but lack the financial means. Will you give them the chance to make a difference?
